Wendy Swallow (Reno Friends Meeting, 2024) “Quakers worship together not because we need to speak, but because sometimes the Spirit gives us words that connect our hearts.”

Britan Yearly Meeting Faith & Practice (Meeting for Worship 2.60) “All true ministry springs from the reality of experience and uses our gifts of heart and mind in its expression. But ministry is not the place for intellectual exercise. It comes through us, not from us.”
